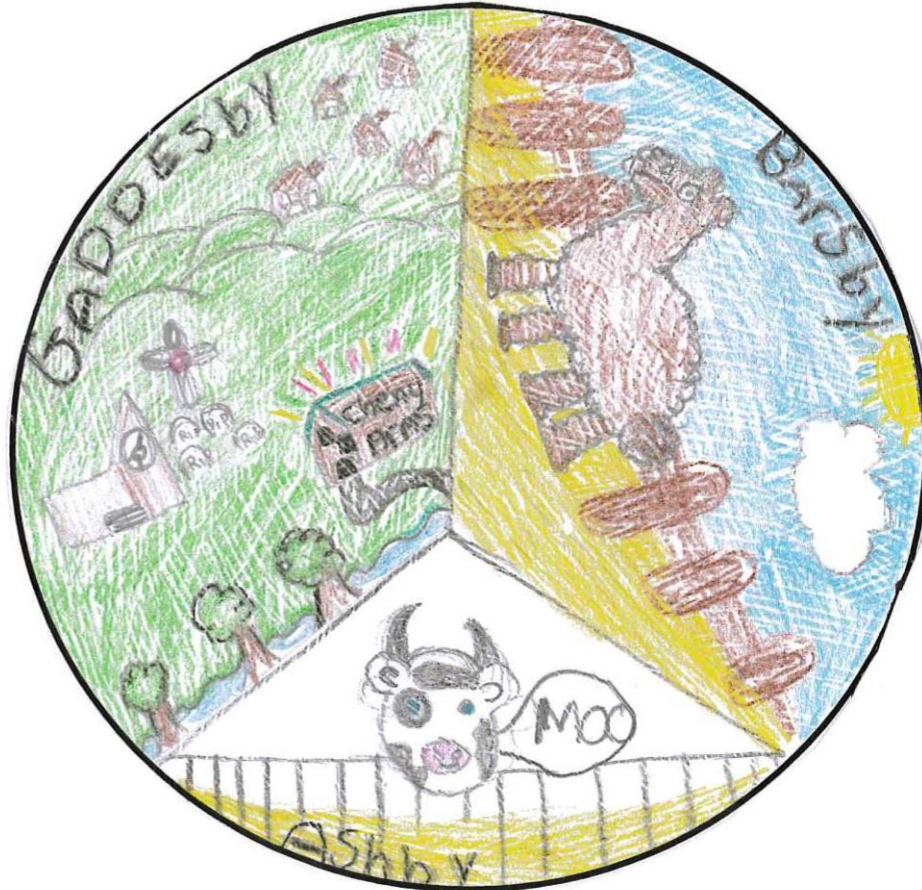


Gaddesby Parish Neighbourhood Plan



Community Consultation Analysis

August 2018

The Parish of Gaddesby has commenced the preparation of their Neighbourhood Plan.

An important part of this inclusive process is, of course, obtaining the views and aspirations of the community. Key to this has been the development and dissemination of a community questionnaire.

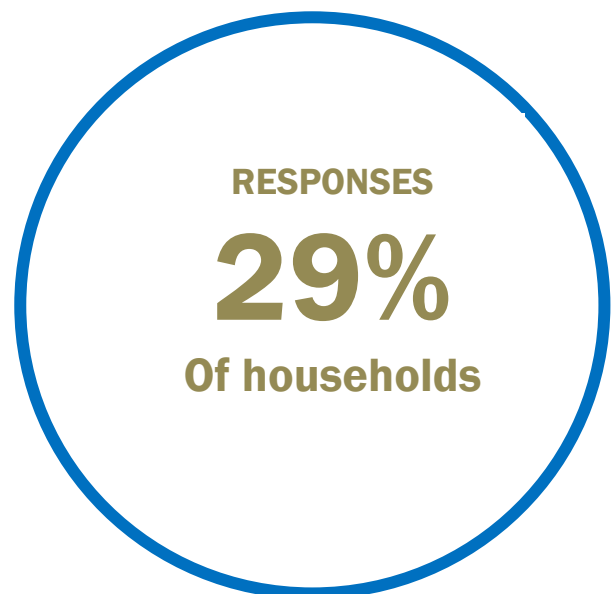
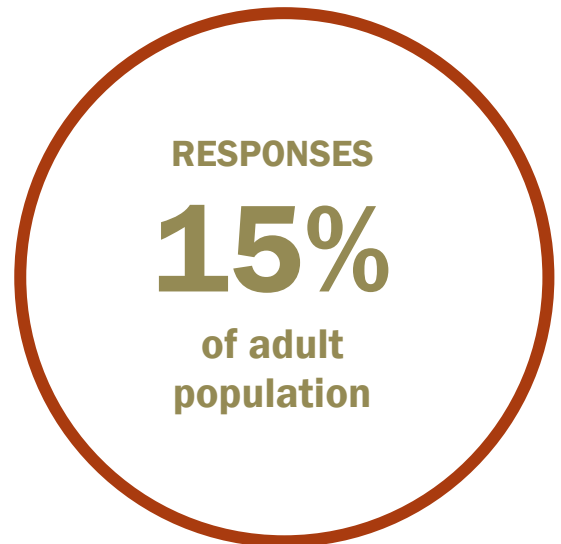
The questionnaire contained 22 questions and is based on important themes established following initial consultation work by the Gaddesby Parish Council.

The survey took place between June and July 2018. It was available to complete electronically and as a paper version. The level of response from the community was good, there being 93 responses. This represents a return from over 12% of the total population of 762 and almost 15% of the adult population, (637 over the age of 16).

Given that some households choose to respond collectively rather than as individuals; it is also pertinent to consider the number of responses in relation to the number of households in the Neighbourhood Plan area. The number of responses represents a little over 29% of the 316 households.

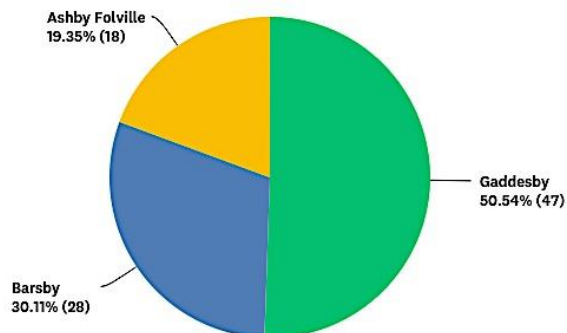
This demonstrates the level of commitment to the Neighbourhood Plan by the small community and, in turn, adds strength to the validity of the collected views expressed.

Respondents didn't collectively identify a majority high need or moderate need for any one property type. There is a strong belief of a moderate need for two/three bedroom homes (49%). There is just one majority held view – that there is a low need for four+ bedroom homes (74%).

12 comments appear in the appendix, showing a range of views, predominant among which are the need for homes for young people and families as well as the desire to see no additional housing in the Parish.

Over 89% of those responding disagree or strongly disagree that new development should be on green field sites. 78% agree that new development should be sympathetic to local style/heritage.

When responding to the need for specific tenure types, it is clear that the majority of respondents do not believe there is a high need for any of them. There is a strong view of there being low need for all tenure types, especially Leasehold, Housing Association and Shared Ownership.

25 responses to this invitation appear in the appendix. Overwhelmingly respondents stated that they do not wish to see any new housing development in the Parish.

Of greatest concern to respondents is the speed and volume of traffic, followed by the issue of street parking.

21 thoughtful comments appear in the appendix, demonstrating concern about parking especially near to the school, but also the adequacy of pedestrian footpaths and the issue of HGVs in the Parish.

Good mobile and broadband services feature as the most valued aspects of community life, followed, more traditionally, by the pubs.

5 comments appear in the appendix. These variously reference the importance of the fete; the lack of village shop/ post office and poor broadband. It was mentioned too that Barsby has no village hall, church, or pub.

Each of the options respondents were offered are considered 'most important' overall. Highest is the desire to protect green spaces within the village followed by hedgerows and woodland. 6 comments appear in the appendix and underline the desire to retain the rural nature of the Parish.

Dog waste bins and the defibrillator are the facilities of highest importance to respondents - more important than the village halls and the cricket fields. These outcomes may benefit from further exploration.

8 comments appear in the appendix. Prominent amongst these is concern about the newsletter.

Respondents consider each of these four options overwhelmingly important. No one felt that any was of low importance.

The three options offered by this question each reveal a high level of concern amongst respondents.

76 responses appear in the appendix covering a wide range of points. However, strong amongst them is the sense of friendliness and community.

Q13 Which *physical* aspect(s) of living in your village do you most value?

71 responses appear in the appendix, which include the importance of green spaces, peace and quiet, the pub, the traditional village setting, the cricket pitches and the opportunity to walk the dog.

In summary, a strong response to the Gaddesby Parish Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire has demonstrated a set of clear concerns and preferences amongst the respondents. This offers a good steer to those actively involved in the development of the Neighbourhood Plan, the wider community and the Parish Council.

These results will become an important part of the evidence gathered to develop the policies of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Appendix

Q2 How important would the following be to any new development?

- We need to encourage young families into rural villages i.e. out of big towns so that the small villages have some activity and don't die.
- Small cottages are desperately in need, which are both inexpensive and will bring in young families to small villages that are massively in need of young blood.
- No houses at all required.
- Not affected - 91 years.
- Low cost housing - as long as they not allowed to be Buy to let.
- Village hall. Ticked 2.
- Senior citizens homes. Ticked 2.
- No further development required.
- No housing wanted.
- No need for homes with more than 4 bedrooms
- Lack of new larger homes in the village, I believe the village has the right amount of homes based on the infrastructure
- Houses suitable for affluent people to downsize into.

Q5 Additional housing related comments

- Housing Association, shared ownership, rented with a local priority connection absolutely NOT!
- Our village does not need further housing. Residents choose to live here due to low population.
- We remain opposed to the housing allocation for Gaddesby as set out in the Melton local plan; additional housing in the village is not required. A more equitable distribution across the Parish is required.
- Barsby has a mix of farm and private dwellings, the balance has been successful farming community and private houses have gained from each other.
- No more houses at the moment for Barsby.
- We ask that people living and working within the village are given sympathetic treatment. So retaining the village identity. This is a farming village, new because of the size of the holdings, the farming is often part time. Recent planning decisions have not taken this into account.
- No more houses needed in the village. We paid a premium rate to move to the village away from an estate with housing association. The housing association caused mislay to our lives "antisocial behaviour, late parties". We MUST do everything to avoid.
- Some extra consideration should be taken as to the style of new developments to make sure they don't affect the current aesthetics of the village.

- Gaddesby has had a very large number of infill houses over the years, enough!
- Don't feel anything more than infill required in villages. Housing needs survey agreed only moderate numbers required!
- If you refer to the housing survey completed recently you will find there is a very limited requirement for housing in the village.
- Gaddesby has good mixture of property levels does not need more.
- We need permanent residents where possible see Q12 and Q13.
- LEAVE THE VILLAGE AS IT IS! LEAVE VILLAGES ALONE! DEVELOP TOWNS AND BROWNFIELD SITES.
- I feel there is a high need for affordable housing for grown up children to live in the village they were brought up in.(My 2 adult children live in the local village - not Gaddesby/Barsby or Ashby Folville only because of lack of availability?).
- No new housing required. No employment in area, bad local transport services, and new development can spoil current living environment within a conservation context.
- Barsby village could not cope with further development
- With reference to Ashby Folville, there is no requirement for extra housing due lack facilities and flood risk. Any development should be outside village boundaries
- It is no good having rented properties for local people, if the rents are so high, that local people can't afford them.
- Car Parking must be taken into account due to narrow windy road through village and needs to take into account horses and cyclists.
- Q4 - Do not have the data to answer this fully
- There is no need for any further houses in Ashby Folville as it is a small village and as a conservation area any new housing would not fit with the old world historic character of the village
- No more new houses needed, we have had our fair share of new builds as parking on the roads is becoming over run.
- There is a need to balance the community away from high income households.
- Would prefer no more development in the village

Q6 How concerned are you about the following?

- There is not enough parking outside village school
- Thin footpath to school - dangerous. Speeding cars.
- We encourage the Parish Council, the Village Hall community and the social trustees to initiate a coordinated approach to Leicester CC to improve the footpath in front of Lawn Wall, which is unsafe for children and pedestrians.
- HGV and volume of traffic can damage foundations of old property.
- Dog fouling. Ticked 1.
- Lack of footpaths! to Gaddesby. Ticked 1.
- Parking outside school is totally inadequate and now very dangerous.

- Parking for school not adequate
- Parking on footpaths.
- HGV 7.5 tonne limit not enforced
- Lack of highways, landscape maintenance. Ticked 1.
- Residents with gravel drives, not keeping footpaths clear making difficult walking conditions.
- Much dangerous traffic at morning and evening due to school enlargement, now not just local children!
- Pavement alongside main road too narrow for children to walk to school.
- Road calming required
- Our local roads are in appalling state, Gaddesby Lane Barsby and Dalby Rd Ashby have degraded so much that it is impossible for two cars to pass safely in places. The road surface has a lot of loose topping and deep ruts on either side. There will be an accident if these are not attended to.
- The condition of the Gaddesby Lane Barsby and Great Dalby Rd Ashby are in an appalling state. It is impossible for two cars to pass safely and on Great Dalby Rd, the road surface is covered in loose gravel with deep ruts on either side.
- Dangerous, too narrow, footpath from the new development where the Rearsby Lane enters the village for people walking to the school, the pub and the village hall and the same danger applies to the stretch of footpath between Main Street and Church lane.
- There are very few footpaths thereby making it very dangerous to walk along the road. The ruts on the edge of the roads are quite deep in places with a number of potholes.
- Lack of public transport and suitable timetabling of buses.
- Speeding is a major problem and also making chapel lane one way from cross street to Gaddesby/Rearsby Lane would solve issues in accessing
